--Philippians 1:12-20

Aim Of This Lesson— For Christians to see themselves "In Christ" regardless of circumstances, situations, or troubles in life.

Scripture text: --Philippians 1:12-20 niv

¹² Now I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that what has happened to me has actually served to advance the gospel. ¹³As a result, it has become clear throughout the whole palace guard and to everyone else that I am in chains for Christ. ¹⁴ And because of my chains, most of the brothers and sisters have become confident in the Lord and dare all the more to proclaim the gospel without fear. ¹⁵ It is true that some preach Christ out of envy and rivalry, but others out of goodwill. ¹⁶ The latter do so out of love, knowing that I am put here for the defense of the gospel.

Scripture text: --Philippians 1:12-20 niv

¹⁷ The former preach Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely, supposing that they can stir up trouble for me while I am in chains. ¹⁸ But what does it matter? The important thing is that in every way, whether from false motives or true, Christ is preached. And because of this I rejoice. Yes, and I will continue to rejoice, ¹⁹ for I know that through your prayers and God's provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ what has happened to me will turn out for my deliverance. ²⁰ I eagerly expect and hope that I will in no way be ashamed, but will have

sufficient courage so that now as always Christ will be exalted in my body, whether by life or by death.

- How do you see things?
- When things go wrong, when difficulties arise, how do you react as a follower of Christ?
- Do you see purpose in them?

Paul speaks of being imprisoned.

Philippians 1:13 niv

¹³ As a result, it has become clear throughout the whole palace guard and to everyone else that I am in chains for Christ.

 The church at Philippi sent someone to check on Paul. Philippians 2:25 *niv*

²⁵ But I think it is necessary to send back to you Epaphroditus, my brother, co-worker and fellow soldier, who is also your messenger, whom you sent to take care of my needs.

- Paul does not see himself as a prisoner, but as a man "IN Christ!"
- Many of you today are dealing right now with "chains".

Your "chains" maybe →

- An illness or a disease and it has changed your way of life.
- Age related or financial security; concerned about how you will make ends meet.
- Issues with their family, such as problems with their children or grandchildren.

- If you see yourself in "chains," I am hoping Paul will give your "chains" a new meaning this morning. Let me show you how Paul viewed his "chains":
 - 1) For the benefit of the gospel.
 - 2)An Opportunity for others to know Christ.
 - 3) Resulted in his greatest benefit and highest good.

1. Paul viewed his "chains" for the benefit of the Gospel.

Philippians 1:12 *niv*

- ¹² Now I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that what has happened to me has actually served to advance the gospel.
- First this he does is tell the Philippians how the gospel is progressing.
 - The gospel was going forth unrestricted, even though he is in chains.

1. Paul viewed his "chains" for the benefit of the Gospel.

Philippians 1:13 niv

- ¹³As a result, it has become clear throughout the whole palace guard and to everyone else that I am in chains for Christ.
- The palace guard was a unique unit of soldiers who were among the best in the Roman army and devoted to Caesar.
- Paid twice as much as anyone else and received more money at retirement.
- Protected those who would stand trial before Caesar.
 - For two years, one of Rome's best soldiers had to walk in every four hours and chain himself to Paul.

- 1. Paul viewed his "chains" for the benefit of the Gospel.
 - What did Paul do for four hours while he was chained to the soldier?
 - Who was chained to whom, after all?

Philippians 4:22 nkjv

²² All the saints greet you, but especially those who are of Caesar's household.

- How did the gospel find its way into Caesar's palace?
- Is it possible that it was because Paul preached to his soldiers every day?

- 2. Paul viewed his "chains" as an opportunity for others to know Christ. Philippians 1:14-15 niv
 - ¹⁴And because of my chains, most of the brothers and sisters have become confident in the Lord and dare all the more to proclaim the gospel without fear. ¹⁵ It is true that some preach Christ out of envy and rivalry, but others out of goodwill.
- Paul described what most people would consider a "setback" as "progress."
 - Paul was overjoyed that the gospel was being spread by those who harbored "envy and strife" against him.

- 2. Paul viewed his "chains" as *an opportunity for others to know Christ.* Philippians 1:17-18 *niv*
 - ¹⁷ The former preach Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely, supposing that they can stir up trouble for me while I am in chains.
 - These people were probably glad Paul was in chains, and the irony is that Paul was glad he was in chains as well, for the sake of spreading the gospel.

2. Paul viewed his "chains" as an opportunity for others to know Christ. Philippians 1:18 niv

¹⁸ But what does it matter? The important thing is that in every way, whether from false motives or true, Christ is preached. And because of this I rejoice. Yes, and I will continue to rejoice, ¹⁹ for I know that through your prayers and God's provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ what has happened to me will turn out for my deliverance.

• Paul's current imprisonment, as harsh and cruel as it was, will result in Paul's greatest benefit and highest good! It is going to result in his deliverance or salvation.

3. Paul saw his "chains" resulted in his greatest and highest good.

Philippians 1:19 niv

¹⁹ for I know that through your prayers and God's provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ what has happened to me will turn out for my deliverance.

- Two factors would contribute to his greatest benefit and highest good. One is human beings, and the other is divine.
- Their prayers and the provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

3. Paul saw his "chains" resulted in his greatest and highest good.

- Whatever they prayed for, Paul was inspired by their prayers to remain faithful...<u>to trust God no matter what</u>.
- Paul put his faith in the provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ.

3. Paul saw his "chains" resulted in his greatest and highest good.

Philippians 1:20 niv

- ²⁰ I eagerly expect and hope that I will in no way be ashamed, but will have sufficient courage so that now as always Christ will be exalted in my body, whether by life or by death.
- Paul saying, "I have no idea what will happen tomorrow."
- I am not sure what they're going to do next to me. They may never take these chains from me, and I may never leave this prison alive.
 - One thing is certain, however. Whatever happens, I will always honor Christ. It doesn't matter whether I die or live; either way, Jesus will be glorified."
